

advantage of this trip and did a little sightseeing in addition to attending the meeting. It is a beautiful and very hospitable city. I enjoyed getting to learn a little about it.

The Canadian AGM had several interesting speakers including International President Dr. Amany Asfour and provided a Reception at City Hall and a wonderful dinner at the Pink Palace, where we all wore pink.

Our history continues as we move into the 21st Century. BPW continued to be branded as the premiere grassroots organization addressing the wage gap, with most of our Local Organizations participating in events to focus on Equal Pay Day, usually the 2nd Tuesday of April. In 2002, the "Take the Pay Equity Pledge" Campaign asked candidates for Congress to sign a pledge to support the Paycheck Fairness Act. As pledge cards came in, BPW's Local Organizations held press conferences and distributed press releases on those candidates friendly to BPW's focus issue-Pay Equity.



In October 2005, BPW/USA launched Women Joining Forces: Closing Ranks, Opening Doors (WJF), a program to support women veterans as they transition from military to civilian life. This commitment made BPW/USA the first and only non-governmental agency to offer programming that supports women veterans.

Advocacy - Equal Rights Amendment Update. Virginia, Virginia, Virginia NEEDS our help.

Virginia is ONE VOTE AWAY from ratifying the Equal Rights Amendment. This fall, every seat in the Virginia Senate and the House of Delegates is up for election. I wrote about the situation of Virginia back in January/February BUT something happened since then. Federal judges selected a new House of Delegates district map that revised boundaries of 26 districts. With the new districts, many House of Delegates races are more evenly matched than they have been for a decade or more. This November Virginia voters have a once in a lifetime opportunity to make constitutional history by electing candidates who will ratify the Equal rights Amendment.

Now Virginia ratification requires a change in the House leadership. We saw this very clearly during the General Assembly 2019. Virginia needs our support whether it by donating funds, signing up for their newsletter, or contacting them to join the campaign. (<u>https://varatifyera.org</u>)

The Virginia Ratify ERA wants to be that 38th State. The state number required to ratify the amendment to correct the purposeful, historical exclusion of women from the Constitution. We are all repeating the "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

We can make it happen. Please take a moment and visit the link. Take action, please.

But look what is happening in North Carolina. ERA Billboards are appearing everywhere. The AAUW and the ERA NC are busy. The message says it all for North Carolina residents. "Women Have 0 Equal Rights." Please read it. I wish to thank Marsha Riibner-Cady, our NFBPWC Recording Secretary, for sending the photo onto me. She lives in North Carolina and is keeping a watch for us. If Virginia doesn't make the 38th state, North Carolina is sure working hard that their state gets in the history books. What ERA enthusiasm in these two southern states!

Join Global Climate Strike

As the chair of the environmental committee for both Business & Professional Women of Colorado and the National Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs, I have been trying to think of a "Starbucks Campaign" for the last few years. I am a Starbucks Gold Card member. Yes, I know some of you may criticize me for being a patron of this huge – and often irresponsible – corporation. But If Starbucks were to become a leader in being sustainable, it could make a tremendous difference in educating folks! So, one reason is I hoped it would make me more credible when urging them to do better environmentally.





I have written to Starbucks for years and had face-to-face meetings with the district manager and managers of different stores in Boulder County, trying to get them to encourage more folks to bring in their own coffee cups by raising the 10-cent discount for doing this as well as urging them to use real cups unless folks are getting their beverage to go. (Of course, it would also be great if they would use recyclable plastics and coffee cups.) I also wrote them almost every day during April 2018, with ideas on how to celebrate Earth Day. I wrote them several times this past April as well to no avail.

Moreover, I sent the current manager of the 2770 Pearl Street store in Boulder and the district manager nice Christmas cards in 2018, thanking them for having good coffee and stellar employees – and to tell them I was looking forward to meeting with them at the beginning of the new year to discuss how Starbucks might be "greener." I followed up several times, but got no response.

Several months ago, one of our BPW Boulder interns suggested that young people today would rather do something outrageous about environmental degradation, like a protest. At the time, I thought that would be too extreme and didn't want to ruffle any feathers – but now I'm done with being polite to Starbucks!

So when I saw the chance through 350.org to hold a climate strike, I jumped on it (see <u>https://350.org/support-climate-strikes</u>). And since I was doing that, I finally made a petition about Starbucks through <u>change.org</u>, which I'd also been putting off.

The Global Climate Strike is happening as a coalition of several organizations, including 350.org, International Indigenous Youth Council, and US Youth Climate Strikes. It is based on Greta Thunberg's School Climate Strikes. Thunberg is the amazing 16-year-old from Sweden who has made the news as a climate activist; she's done a TED talk and was even nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize! Inspired by Thunberg, young students have been holding strikes around the world for the past six months to raise awareness that climate change is the biggest issue that humankind has ever faced.

And now adults are being asked to join in on September 20, 2019. Organizers say this is only the beginning of a week of action; we'll all be working towards influencing our candidates in the 2020 election. You can see where climate strikes are being held—or organize your own—at <u>https://strikewithus.org</u>. I hope BPW chapters all around the USA will establish some events. I also hope just about everyone will participate; you don't have to be anyone special—just someone with passion!

The Boulder strike will be held on Friday, September 20, noon to 1:30 pm, at the northwest corner of 28th Street and Pearl Street, near Starbucks, Floyd's, and Wahoo's Fish Taco, where there is a large patio. I am hoping to get a permit so we can have a sound system with speakers. Possible speakers include Governor Polis, Representative Joe Neguse, Rosie Briggs of Eco-Cycle, Representative and Speaker of Colorado House KC Becker, and Representative Edie Hooton. Some organizations I hope to be involved are 350.org, Boulder Time Bank, BPW, Eco-Cycle, Girl Scouts, Rocky Mountain Peace and Justice Center, the Women's Collaborative of Boulder County, and eco groups from local high schools. III. LOSS OF BIODIVERSITY

35. In assessing the environmental impact of any project, concern is usually shown for its effects on soil, water and air, yet few careful studies are made of its impact on biodiversity, as if the loss of species or animals and plant groups were of little importance. Highways, new plantations, the fencing-off of certain areas, the damming of water sources, and similar developments, crowd out natural habitats and, at times, break them up in such a way that animal populations can no longer migrate or roam freely. As a result, some species face extinction. Alternatives exist which at least lessen the impact of these projects, like the creation of biological corridors, but few countries demonstrate such concern and foresight. Frequently,

when certain species are exploited commercially, little attention is paid to studying their reproductive patterns in order to prevent their depletion and the consequent imbalance of the ecosystem.

I DID IT! AND I'M SORRY AND SINCERELY APOLOGIZE

Ever heard that from the accused sexual harassment predator? Nope.

More like this: "The allegations from these unnamed individuals dating back as many as 30 years are deeply troubling, and, as presented, inaccurate.

"Still it is painful to hear that I may have upset anyone or made them feel uncomfortable - no matter how long ago and despite my best intentions. I believe that all of my interactions and relationships were always welcomed and consensual. People who know me or who have worked with me know that I am not someone who would intentionally harm, offend, or embarrass anyone.

[Wait for it... it's coming...here it is!]

"However, I recognize that the rules and standards by which we are - and should be - measured against today are very different than they were in the past. I am blessed and privileged to have had a more than 50-year career in opera and will hold myself to the highest standards." [Catherine Womack of L.A. TIMES reporting 08/15/19].

Various reactions by professionals in his career to his statement include "He's admitting that the 'rules and standards' have changed but declares that his relationships were always welcomed. If that's true, then why does it matter that rules and standards have changed? He's trying to have it both ways."

And" "...he places the blame on generation and age"..." It refers to the women in dehumanizing ways, calling them "unnamed" which is false because one of the women is named..." in the article by Associated Press which

disclosed allegations by nine women [8 singers and 1 dancer] of sexual harassment during the '80's, '90's. and early 2000's.

In other words, Sir, sexual harassment in the workplace was okay 30 years ago but not today, right? Wrong. What's changed is women are speaking out and the public is hearing their voices and has responded; the #MeToo reckoning has changed the culture of silence.

And who is this falling Macbeth, this tragic hero with the serious flaw? He is 78-year old Placido Domingo, the general director of Los Angeles Opera and arguably the most famous living figure in classical music. In the 1980's, the Spaniard, along with Luciano Pavarotti and Jose Carreras, as The Three Tenors, carried the magnificent world of opera to populist heights. His professional accomplishments over a 60-year career are extensive.

Watch the progress of this unfolding drama after the Associated Press reported "detailed alleged instances of unwanted sexual advances and perceived retaliation when those advances were rejected", as just this week [8/21/19], the L.A. Opera has hired a prominent and well-experienced attorney, Debra Wong Yang, of a prominent legal firm, Gibson, Dunn & Crutcher, to conduct a "thorough and independent investigation" into the allegations.






