

contact their senators and let them know they support the ERA. Unfortunately, a vote to remove the deadline for state ratification was rejected in April but this will not stop the Advocacy Committee's fight or silence them.

BPW-USA's Environment and Sustainable Development Committee is focusing this year's efforts on "simple acts" that members can participate in to address environmental degradation. Each month a member of the committee writes an article for the magazine empowering members with knowledge to address climate change. This year's topics have included: bringing back pollinators, reducing food waste, addressing climate migration, visiting farmer's markets and participating in CSA's, and the No Mow May initiative. The committee also hosted an Earth Day event in April featuring Candace Fallon, Senior Conservation Biologist at Endangered Species Program Xerces Society. The pre-recorded and streamed event was titled "Fireflies: Jewels of the Night" focusing on conservation techniques to save the endangered fireflies. The event was attended by over 100 members and guests.

BPW-USA's Justice Diversity Equity Inclusion Committee has been diligently working throughout the year to host events that bring awareness to discrimination and abuse. The committee hosted Women & Resilience: A Conflict Resolution, Financial Security and Life Necessity Presented by Alia Ismail and Violence Against Women Under the Light of Justice panel discussion with guest panelists sharing real life stories of escaping violent situations and those representing organizations working to end violence against women.

BPW-USA was delighted to have BPW delegates worldwide join us in New York City for the Leader's Summit and Clare Fulcher dinner as well as the 67<sup>th</sup> Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) in March. It was a busy two weeks filled with engaging panels, events, and BPW fun. We look forward to hosting our BPW sisters again next year at CSW68.

BPW-USA has started an exciting new initiative to end period poverty. Led by Young BPW in partnership with Advocacy and Health Committees, the Period Poverty Initiative aims to bring awareness to the issue of period poverty, advocate for legislature to increase access to period products, and end the stigma around menstruation and menopause. #### ERA Centennial Convention in Seneca Falls, NY

**Purpose**: The ERA Centennial Convention seeks to mark the important historic milestone of the ERA Centennial, celebrate the women and queer people who have fought for the ERA for 100 years, push for finalizing the federal ERA, and launch the grassroots fight for a New York state-level ERA ballot initiative. The goal is to mark the century-long fight to get the ERA into the Constitution by ending it.

**Objective**: The objective of the ERA Centennial Convention is to hold an intergenerational convening on July 21-22, 2023 in Seneca Falls, NY at the <u>First Presbyterian Church of Seneca Falls</u> where the National Woman's Party first unveiled the ERA—at the exact same podium Alice Paul gave her speech that day, 100 years ago. The event will be focused on cultivating the next generation of ERA activists and helping them see their place in history as constitution makers. The target will be to have at least one ERA activist from all 50 states attend the in-person event to build a nationwide network of advocates, and set goals for constitutional equality for the next year.

The Convention will be action-oriented. We will ground ourselves in a critical examination of the past in order to make choices for the future that will help create a more diverse, inclusive, effective ERA movement going forward.

**Advocacy - Equal Rights Amendment**. "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State on account of sex" needs to be placed into our Constitution. While most states have laws prohibiting discrimination of any kind based on sex, proponents of the E.R.A. say laws can be reversed or eliminated. Having a Constitutional Amendment would cement those rights.

# From the Desk of the Secretary

In October of 22022, my daughter and son-in-law took in two young children removed from their parents due to neglect and abuse. The family was homeless at the time the children were placed in the foster care system. Before this our family had no experience with or understanding of the foster care system and the challenges faced by all involved. The information below is from the website of The Annie E. Casey Foundation and is a very brief highlight regarding the nationwide situation of youth homelessness.

#### The Annie E. Casey Foundation and Youth Homelessness-March 28, 2023

Not all young people have the benefit of growing up in a safe and stable home. In fact: Across America, 1 in 30 youth between the ages of 13 to 24 and 1 in 10 young adults between the ages of 18 to 25 will experience homelessness over the course of a year. This scenario — which occurs during an important developmental period — can inject trauma into a young person's life, limit their growth and carry costly community consequences.

In recognition of these challenges, the Annie E. Casey Foundation is joining partners in the field, such as Funders Together to End Homelessness, to ensure that young people have safe, stable housing access to meaningful educational and economic opportunities.

To ensure that all young people have a safe and stable place to live, and the resources needed to thrive and grow into adulthood, the Foundation makes the following recommendations:

- develop a unified definition of youth homelessness.
- focus on prevention.
- target funding to basic needs and other youth homelessness risks
- support cross-systems partnerships.
- advance equity.
- elevate youth voices.
- transform the justice system response; and
- help young people leaving foster care prepare for adulthood.

#### Unstable, unsafe housing situations sets youth on a pathway to greater trauma, risk and instability.

Youth experiencing homelessness on their own are more likely than their peers in the general population to endure threats to their health, safety, and well-being. These threats include:

- missing school, resulting in higher rates of dropping out, poverty and involvement in the criminal justice system.
- struggling with mental health issues, including suicidal thoughts and suicide attempts.
- abusing alcohol or drugs.
- being physically assaulted.
- being sexually assaulted.
- being trafficked for sex or labor; and
- resorting to "survival crime," including selling drugs, stealing, and exchanging sex for basic needs.



#### **Findings & Statistics**

#### Millions of Youths Affected

About 3.5 million young adults ages 18 to 25 and 700,000 youth ages 13 to 17 experience some form of homelessness in a given year, according to Chapin Hall, an independent, nonpartisan policy research center at the University of Chicago.

#### The Risk of Homelessness Varies

Not all young people experience homeliness at the same rate. Youth who are Black (83% higher), LGBTQ (120% higher) and non-white Hispanic (33% higher) all experience greater rates of homelessness.

#### Wanted: A Unified Definition of Homelessness

Establishing a unified and inclusive definition of youth homelessness is key. Such work makes data collection, sharing and analysis easier across systems and also helps to improve how quickly and effectively these systems can identify and support youth in need.

America's Love Letter to Women on February 14, 1920

My valentine, I thought to bring you brownies, or perhaps a sweet wine. But I recall you swore off alcohol and wish your chocolates kept in line.

Do not be afraid. The war's end is in sight. I will answer your prayer despite turbulent times.

For no love letter, reads sweeter, than a Ballot.

To be treated like citizens is not a difficult request.

To have a say in the laws men made, a form of expression for women denied the right to change their own children's lives. It feels silly to imagine a time when it seemed the majority were blind, or could not, should not pick up a pen, a good education reserved for the "talented tenth."

Woman screamed as she ripped down yellow walls. She hadn't seen the sunlight in centuries. Pandora's music box rang out of Woman's throat. A curse, broken, with a vote.

Simple Acts: Curbing Your Carbon Emissions: 3 New Driving Habits and 6 Tricks to Making them Stick

When it comes to curbing carbon emissions out on the road, we already know to choose fuel efficient vehicles, keep tires properly inflated, and, of course, carpool when we can. But many of us may not be aware we have some bad driving habits that are significantly increasing our carbon emissions.

#### BAD HABIT #1: Driving-thru.

Whether at banks, pharmacies, or fast-food chains, idling engines contribute to needless emissions of greenhouse gases. The US <u>Department of Energy</u> estimates that idling in a car for as little as 10 seconds produces more emissions than restarting a car's engine, and that eliminating idling would be like taking five million vehicles off the roads!

#### BAD HABIT #2: Searching for parking.

Motorists spend an average of 17 hours a year searching for parking spots on streets, in lots, or in garages. According to the analysis by INRIX, a

leading specialist in transportation analytics, parking hunting adds up to about \$345 per driver in wasted time, fuel, and emissions—not to mention contributing to traffic congestion, which increases emissions even more.

**BAD HABIT #3: Being late!** Running late not only tempts us to drive at faster speeds, but accelerate faster at stoplights and onramps, increasing our carbon emissions. Even speeding up to pass other cars can lower your gas mileage by 33 percent at highway speeds.

But just like with any other bad habits, we can replace them with new, healthier habits! Here are three new habits to incorporate into your daily driving routine:

**NEW HABIT #1:** Start skipping the drive-thru lane and, instead, park the car and walk inside to do your business. You'll get more "steps" logged on your FitBit, too.

**NEW HABIT #2:** Instead of slowly crawling through the parking lot looking for the closest possible spot to the store, try entering the lot from the back. Take the first open spot you find and you'll park in a fraction of the time, lower carbon emissions, get a little exercise, and probably get to the store even faster than you imagined.

**NEW HABIT #3:** Calm down on your commute by leaving ten minutes earlier. You'll worry less about being late, stay chill during traffic jams and road construction congestion, and burn a lot less fuel!

Now anyone who ever made a New Year's resolution knows that new habits can be hard to maintain. Here are six tricks that help make your new habits stick:

#### 1. Write them Down

The act of writing a goal on a piece of paper actually increases the likelihood of success. Goals that are written will help keep you motivated, accountable, and on track.

#### 2. Commit to 30 Days

According to studies, 30 days is how long it takes to rewire your brain and make a new habit become automatic. If you can power through the first month, the new behavior becomes much easier to sustain.

#### 3. Start Simple

Trying to adopt three new habits at the same time can feel overwhelming. Pick just one of the three new habits to commit to for the first month. Once you make the first one stick you can add the next one, and the next.

#### 4. Remind Yourself

Placing reminders of your goals on post-it notes on your dashboard will help you stay motivated.

#### 5. Run it as an Experiment

Considering the cultivation of a new habit as an "experiment" (rather than a permanent life alteration) can provide a psychological boost to get us started and keep going.

#### 6. Remind yourself of the benefits

Write post-it note reminders about how your new habits are helping the planet!

Three Simple Acts to help the Planet:

Ditch the drive-thru.

Park in the back.

Keep calm... and leave earlier on.

# Goal Setting

(in Business and in Life)

They say that some truths are universal – so are some practices. They work for us in life and are as powerful in business as well.



# "You gotta have a goal? Do you have a goal?"

How many times have we heard those words? I don't know about you, but I always here them in the voice of Kit from the movie Pretty Woman, played by Laura San Giacomo.

When you are setting goals, try using these four words as the foundation of your goal setting process, and you will be in the best position to hit your target.





Question: How will you know if you achieved your goal, if you aren't **SPECIFIC** about what "it" is?

Would a marathon runner run a race if they didn't know where the finish line was?

When you determine your goal, be sure you can recognize your "**finish line**."



Focusing on the good is a better goal setting practice than adopting a negative perspective. Accept that failure or less that perfect is a part of the process but be **POSITIVE** in your goal measurements and standards.



There's an aphorism about having "skin in the game" that speaks to the next term: **IMPORTANT**. When something is important to you, it takes on a more personal priority. When it comes to goal setting, if you can explain why it makes a difference to you – it tends to push up the success rate.



Goal Setting and Wishful Thinking are two different things. One important distinction is that with realistic, achievable goal setting, there must be some element of **CONTROL** within your grasp.

You could buy a lottery ticket, but you have no control over winning.

#### **Examples:**

Vague vs Specific: "I want more clients" / "I will get 10 more clients quarter"

Negative vs Positive: "Don't be late for appointments" / "Arrive early"

Making it Important: "The website needs updating" / "Updating the website will keep the customers coming back and shopping"

Out of my control / in my control: I can't control where my ideal clients are, but I can control where I position my products (visibility/proximity to them).

# Creating specific, positive, important goals that are within your control can be challenging, but it is a worthwhile method for achievement.

# July Highlights in US Women's History

#### July Highlights in US Women's History

In July we celebrate essential democratic anniversaries — the birth of the United States on July 4, 1776 and the birth of the Women's Rights Movement on July 19-20, 1848.

#### Anniversary of the First Women's Rights Conference (July 19 and 20)

On July 19-20, 1848, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott spearheaded the first women's rights convention in American History. Over 300 women and men came to Seneca Falls, New York to protest the

mistreatment of women in social, economic, political, and religious life. This marked the first public meeting calling for women's right to vote.

#### July Women's History Events

- July 2, 1979 The Susan B. Anthony dollar is released
- July 2, 1937 Amelia Earhart's plane is lost in the Pacific Ocean near Howland Island
- July 2, 1964 President Lyndon Johnson signs the Civil Rights Act; Title VII prohibits sex discrimination in employment
- July 4, 1876 Suffragists crash the Centennial Celebration in Independence Hall to present the Vice President with the "Declaration of the Rights of Women" written by Matilda Joselyn Gage
- July 6, 1957 Althea Gibson is the first African American woman player to win a Wimbledon title in women's tennis singles
- July 7, 1981 President Reagan nominates Sandra Day O'Connor as the first woman Supreme Court Justice?
- July 12, 1984 Representative Geraldine Ferraro (D-New York) is chosen as the first female to run for Vice President of the United States on the Democratic Party ticket with Walter Mondale (D-Minnesota)
- July 14, 1917 16 women from the National Women's Party were arrested while picketing the White House demanding universal women's suffrage; they were charged with obstructing traffic
- July 19-20, 1848 The Seneca Falls Convention, the country's first women's rights convention, is held in Seneca Falls, New York <u>Women's Rights Movement</u>
- July 20, 1942 The first class of Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC) begins at Fort Des Moines, IA
- July 29, 1974. "Philadelphia Eleven" deacons (Merrill Bittner, Alla Bozarth-Campbell, Alison Cheek, Emily Hewitt, Carter Heyward, Suzanne Hiatt, Marie Moorefield, Jeannette Piccard, Betty Schiess, Katrina Swanson, and Nancy Wittig) ordained as the first women Episcopal priests

BPW Colorado held our **Annual Convention** on **Saturday**, **June 17**, with the Business Meeting in the morning via Zoom and the social event in person in the afternoon. It was quite an eventful day.

At the Business Meeting, the current slate of officers was re-elected; they were installed in the afternoon at the social event. Therefore, the "new" officers for 2023-2024 are the following:

Reports were given at the Business Meeting by all the officers, committee chairs, and chapter presidents. The report on Membership revealed the good news that BPW Colorado has been slowly increasing its membership. We also had reports from special NFBPWC guests – Kathy Kelly, Vice President for Membership, and Kalee Carmel, Treasurer – as well as a letter from National President Megan Shellman-Rickard, which was read to the attendees.

BPW Colorado's affiliate organization, Colorado Women's Education Foundation (CWEF), reported that it has raised \$95,000 to provide scholarships for the next year (which go to women over 25 who are furthering their higher education). CWEF has received 73 applications for this year! Two of the past year's recipients spoke at the social event in the afternoon and told how impactful the scholarship they received from CWEF has been in improving their lives.

At the end of the Business Meeting, I took a moment of personal privilege to thank the Executive Committee members for their extraordinary effort over the past year. Despite each one of us facing some personal challenges at one time or another, the group met faithfully every month to ensure that BPW Colorado remained fiscally sound and fulfilled its obligations. BPW Colorado is fortunate to have such a dedicated group who are willing to continue for another year!

At the social event, we had the opportunity to hear from two members of coalitions we worked with on the passage of our top-priority legislation. Ellen Buckley from the Plaintiff Employment Lawyers Association (PELA) spoke about Senate Bill 23-172, Protecting Opportunities and Workers' Rights. One of the key provisions of this bill is that it eliminates the harsh standard of "severe and pervasive" for employees who suffer from harassment on the job to take legal action. Colorado is the 3<sup>rd</sup> state in the U.S. to pass this kind of law (New York and California are the others). Louise Myrland from the Colorado Women's Foundation spoke about Senate Bill 23-105, Equal Pay for Equal Work. This bill builds on the state's equal pay law passed a few years ago, when Colorado became the first state to require pay transparency; the bill improves the process for filing complaints against employers who violate the equal pay law, and it expands enforcement of the law.




The South Florida BPW Club had our June social at a beautiful venue on the IntraCoastal.

Since its release, the feature film, Pioneers in Skirts, has garnered user ratings on IMDb.


While the film is currently sitting at a positive 8.7 (weighted) average score, 20% of the ratings are 1 star, the lowest possible option.

# Women of the Great Seal by Barbara Bozeman

From the early days of the United States, when the first states were colonized, every state has been represented by a seal. Since North Carolina declared its independence, there have been 10 versions of the Great Seal of the State of North Carolina. Most recently, changes / standardizations were made official in 1971 and then the last modification was made by the General Assembly in 1983.

This is the Great Seal of the State of North Carolina:



There are two women in the Great Seal. They are the figures known as "Liberty" and "Plenty."

**Liberty** is on the left (red). In her left hand is a pole with a cap on the top. In her right is a scroll with the word "Constitution" on it. Liberty is a version of Athena and Minerva. Athena (Greek goddess) and Minerva (Roman goddess) both represented liberty in their respective country's mythology.

The cap – came from the Roman Pileus – a cap worn by freed slaves in the Roman era. In colonial times, this liberty cap was a strong symbol of freedom in America and France.

The scroll containing the word Constitution, in her right hand, makes the statement that the Constitution protects Liberty.

**Plenty**, the woman seated on the right, has her hand on a cornucopia – a symbol of food and abundance. Though what filled the cornucopia over the years has changed, it is also known as the "horn of plenty" which is a symbol for the vast and diverse resources of this state.

The Great Seal of the State of North Carolina is one of only nine state seals (including the District of Columbia) with women on their state seals.

State Seals with Women: Arkansas, California, District of Columbia, Florida, Idaho, New Jersey, New York, and South Carolina.

She holds a degree in Chemistry from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and is currently employed as a Business/Cost Analyst at BCL Manufacturing in Windber, PA. Ms. Holgash has held many Chairs and Offices at all levels of BPW to include Past State President of the Heritage organization. Emily is a 20+ year member of the National Contracts Management Associates where she has held various officer positions. In her spare time she served as a Director of Music Ministries at St. Anthony of Padua Church in Windber and holds several certifications in Lay Ministry as well as Cantor's Certifications. Congratulations to Emily!

PA affiliate Chapter members Nancy Werner and Cathy Collins attend NFBPWC Membership Committee Meetings via Zoom with Kathy Kelly, Vice President (Membership) and the Membership Committee twice per month.

Lilly Gioia, PA Affiliate Chapter Legislation/Advocacy Chair continues to provide the members with the latest legislation issues affecting women and Pennsylvania happenings affecting women. Lilly attends monthly NFBPWC Advocacy Meetings as part of the NFBPWC Advocacy Team.

Lilly reported that one issue that was discussed was the Period Poverty Initiative. This committee, chaired by Emily VanVleck, is focused on raising awareness about those girls and women unable to afford period products and are missing school and other things because of this. The committee tried to assist members in Florida where the legislature intended to pass a bill prohibiting any mention of "menstruation" before the 6th grade in public schools. Lilly drafted a letter to editors of a half dozen Florida newspaper editors condemning the bill, particularly because many girls begin menstruating in 4th and 5th grades. A Florida member sent the letters, but the bill passed anyway. Lilly also wrote to the U.S House of Representatives Democratic Women's Caucus, requesting that they add menstruation education and period poverty to their mission statement agenda. She

also sent four letters to our four Pennsylvania Congresswomen, asking them to take leadership in the Democratic Women's Caucus on this issue. Since then California Rep. Judy Chu introduced a bill on this issue.

At the NFBPWC Advocacy meeting Lilly spoke about FEMICIDE and the potential for more guns being returned to domestic abusers who were forced to relinquish their firearms under Protection Orders. The 2022 Supreme Court Ruling NY State Rifle & Pistol Association v. Bruen ruling is being used, not only by abusers seeking to get their guns back, but can be used as a legal means of having ALL gun safety laws declared unconstitutional as violations under the Second Amendment. Refer to Lilly Gioia's update on Femicide Part I, which follows this Report. Femicide Part II will be available in the August newsletter. We are grateful for all of Lilly's research and in-depth analysis.

We continue to provide information on our Facebook page thanks to members Ginny Bailey and Emily Holgash, who continue to research and place information on this page.

Members have been encouraged to continue to review the NFBPWC Website and monthly newsletter and to take advantage of the great programs that are offered. The International BPW Newsletter is also available to members.

# Pennsylvania Advocacy Report

DO WOMEN'S LIVES MATTER TO FEDERAL COURTS?

#### NEW YORK STATE RIFLE v. BRUEN - VIRTUALLY NO GUN REGULATION IS SAFE:

In its 2022 session the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade. As all attention turned to women's reproductive health advocacy, the immediate focus was on protecting access to abortion care in individual states. But another 2022 blockbuster ruling called N.Y. State Rifle & Pistol Association v. Bruen was not then identified as the equally serious threat to women's lives it has become. In the 12 months since, federal courts in several states have ruled in favor of restoring gun access to domestic abusers based upon the Bruen 6-3 majority ruling written by Justice Clarence Thomas. Bruen trashed more than a decade of case law governing which gun laws are constitutional. It is just as much a life and death threat to women as the Dobbs ruling because now Orders of Protection in some states can no longer prevent domestic abusers from getting or keeping their guns! Just days after the Bruen ruling struck down New York's 100 year-old law restricting concealed carry, President Joe Biden signed the Bi-partisan Safer Communities Act. As the first major gun safety legislation passed by Congress in nearly 30 years, the Safer Communities Act does allow those convicted of misdemeanor domestic violence crimes to restore gun rights after five years if no other crimes are committed. However, Second Amendment expert, UCLA Law Professor Adam Winkler, noted much of the new bi-partisan bill could be endangered by the Bruen opinion. (2022 was the second highest year on record for mass shootings in America.)

In March of 2019 Stephanie Miller drove to a Radnor PA Wawa to pick up her son in what was supposed to be one of her regular custody exchanges with his father. Over the years her ex-husband had threatened her. Miller had received a Court protection from abuse order which had expired only months earlier. She chose a crowded, public spot for the custody exchange thinking it would protect her. It didn't. That day Miller's ex-husband shot and executed her. Stephanie Miller was one of more than 1,600 people who died in Pennsylvania over the past 10 years as a result of domestic violence. In 2021 alone, 112 Pennsylvania victims lost their lives during violent incidents involving family or intimate partners, according to the PA Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

Writing in Vox, Ian Millhiser concluded "<u>Vast swaths of American gun laws are now in terrible danger."</u> The 2022 Bruen ruling now puts the burden on the government to prove in courts that a gun regulation "<u>is consistent with this nation's historical tradition of firearms regulation."</u> Under this twisted and confusing standard, gun regulations from the 1700's based on historical evidence, will determine the availability of guns now in the 21st century. Among other things, early American laws rarely offered much, if any, protection to victims of domestic violence. Post Bruen, many judges who once depended on a 30-year federal law calling for gun removal, are struggling now with murky guidelines.

State lawyers who are not trained as historians and who may know very little about how to research ancient gun regulation, now must learn those skills on the fly. Should they fail to convince a judiciary dominated by conservative Republican appointees, their state's firearms laws could be declared unconstitutional. In a domestic abuse case a Texas appeals court initially ruled for gun removal, but the case was subsequently refiled after the Bruen decision to seek a different outcome. The very conservative 5th Circuit Court ruled that a man who pleaded guilty to violating a protective order and threatening his ex-girlfriend, their child and a neighbor at gun point, can keep his weapons based on Bruen. Six conservative Supreme Court Justices who overturned Roe v. Wade, simultaneously have authored a devastating decision for anyone who cares about reducing gun violence.

#### KENTUCKY JUDGE STRIKES DOWN LAW BANNING GUNS IN DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CASES:

In February 2023, saying it violates the Second Amendment rights of gun owners, a Kentucky federal judge struck down a law that bans subjects of domestic violence orders from buying or possessing firearms. Kentucky has the second highest rate of domestic violence, according to reported data. Domestic violence advocates say the ruling will put them and others at risk, according to a Kentucky Courier Journal report. "When people who commit domestic violence have access to firearms, the lethality risk increases by 1,000% for survivors, their families and for community members," a Kentucky Coalition Against Domestic Violence statement said. Kentucky courts handle nearly 4,000 domestic violence cases a year, Charges were dismissed against Sherman Combs, a "prohibited person," for possessing a .357 Magnum revolver after a protective order was issued to his wife. U.S. District Judge Danny Reeves said the federal statute violates the Second Amendment which says the "right to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed." Judge Reeves cited the U.S. Supreme Court 2022 decision N.Y. State Rifle & Pistol Association v. Bruen, stating a gun control law can only stand if it "aligns with the nation's historical tradition of firearms regulation." For now the decision is only binding in the Eastern District of Kentucky. Thomas Lyons, Combs' attorney, acknowledged it could increase the risk of harm for domestic violence victims but said, "Protection of constitutional rights often has societal costs."

CNN reported that striking down gun control measures will discourage victims from coming forward. When a victim decides to come forward and seek a court's intervention, it is a particularly vulnerable time for her. Victims feel safer when protective orders come with a two-prong effect of both keeping their abuser away and depriving them of a lethal weapon. More abusers are now returning to courts since Bruen. They are asking their prior convictions be thrown out under the new 5th Circuit Appeals Court ruling that the law removing their firearms is unconstitutional. Heather Bellino, CEO of the Texas Advocacy Project, said, "People are going to know that their abuser still has their gun. They're going to continue to live in absolute, abject fear." According to the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention, guns are used to commit nearly two-thirds of intimate partner homicides. Some state jurisdictions have used federal law to force an alleged abuser to turn over his weapons once he is placed under a protective order, according to Julia Weber, director of the National Center on Gun Violence in Relationships at the Battered Women's Justice Project.

That makes federal law a critical tool for urging survivors to leave their abusive situations, even if the law's enforcement has been inconsistent across the country. Ruth Glenn, a domestic violence survivor who was shot by her estranged spouse, recalled to CNN how simply being aware that her abuser owned a firearm made her fearful, even when he wasn't actively wielding it against her. "The entire idea was there was always a threat and knowing that the firearm was there, was such a control mechanism," Glenn said.

#### FEMICIDE IS UP; AMERICAN HISTORY SAYS THAT'S NOT SURPRISING:

"Father of Idyllic Family Charged After Driving Tesla Off Cliff"

"Utah Man Kills Wife, Five Children & Mother-in-Law, Police Say."

In February the Washington Post reported these January headlines in a story about 2023 being on pace to top the previous years' rates of femicide, the crime of men, nearly always current or former intimate partners, killing women. Between 2014 (the lowest year on record) and 2020, the incidence of femicide in the United States has increased by 24%, according to a September 2022 Violence Policy Center report. Intimate partner violence rose an estimated 8% during the coronavirus pandemic and does not appear to have subsided. Among our peer countries, the United States accounts for 70% of incidents of femicide (in large part due to accessibility of firearms in the US). Media reports often neglect to shine a light on this chilling reality, Kimberly Hamlin wrote in the Post 2/3/23. Feminist activist Diana Russell began using the term "femicide" in 1976 at the first International Tribunal on Crimes Against Women, to describe the "killing of females by males because they are female." Yet in the U.S., the term "femicide" is rarely used to describe the killings of women by men that takes place on American soil every day.

After the 1994 passage of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA), rates of domestic violence decreased. Why, then since 2014, are more women dying? The Post noted how in 2018 and 2019, Congress floundered over a VAWA provision that would have limited gun access for perpetrators of domestic violence. Arguments about closing the "boyfriend loophole" raged based on fierce N.R.A. opposition. Kimberly Hamlin called out the arc that runs "from former president Donald Trump's crass comments about groping women's bodies to the overturning of Roe v. Wade" having implications not only for public policy, but also for the lives and deaths of women. A significant change is the normalization of a national discourse that dehumanizes women by describing them as sexual objects and/or reproductive vessels, Hamlin wrote.

#### FEMICIDE IN THE U.S. - THE SILENT EPIDEMIC FEW DARE TO NAME:

This headline in The Guardian covered FBI statistics on nationwide homicides. Homicide is the 4<sup>th</sup> leading cause of death for girls and women ages one to 19 and the 5<sup>th</sup> leading cause of death for women 20-44, according to the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention. An average of 70 women are shot and killed by an intimate partner every month in America.

According to FBI analysis of all female homicides accounted for in 2018 where the relationship between perpetrator and victim could be identified, 92% of cases involved women or girls killed by a man they knew. (63% of them were killed by a current husband or ex-husband or current boyfriend). American female intimate gendered killings are happening at a staggering rate. An essential and consistently missing part of the puzzle precedes physical violence and has more to do with power and male entitlement over women according to Mississippi judge Scott Colom. He told the Guardian, "Toxic masculinity does not know class. Historically, there's been a problem with how men have been taught to view women. What I see is that they are treating women like their property. Like, 'This person belongs to me. If I can't have her, nobody can have her. If I am not happy, it's her fault.' It's a frame of mind, of toxic masculinity that I see all the time," Colom says. Teaching men to get out of this frame of mind is crucial. Without doing this, we are left living in a country that has silently accepted femicide as a by-product of its structure — to the extent that it doesn't even bother mentioning it."

Five women each day are killed by men, double what it was 30 years ago. Homicide is now a leading killer of pregnant women. Men fearlessly threaten and commit violence against women because there are rarely consequences, noted Equal Means Equal lead attorney Wendy Murphy in a Boston Globe Op-Ed. The CDC estimates that about 1/3 of American women report experiencing some form of "severe physical violence" from intimate partners during their lifetime. This can have long-term consequences for them and their children.

## "Scranton Man Pleads Guilty to Murder of Wife"

This headline tells local newspaper readers how Thomas R, Evans, 38, stabbed and shot his wife, Tara, to death in their Lackawana County home on 9/13/20. He "slashed Tara Evans' throat, stabbed her and shot her in the back of the head after learning she planned to leave him. Her 14-year old son found her body wrapped in plastic

and stuffed inside a trunk in a bedroom." Paul Ackourey, Evans' attorney said in court, "It's tragic that steps were not taken before to address the root problem." The son who found his mother's body was offered counseling services, but declined them.

Enjoy a cup of tea on July 9th and celebrate!


It was a thrill for me to visit Seneca Falls and the Women's Rights National Historic Park in May of 2022.
